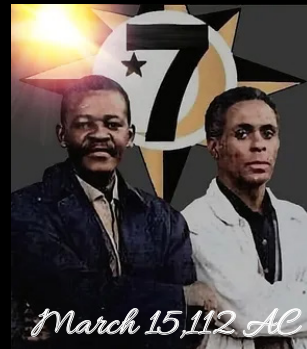

Peace! Following a beautiful and productive Parliament in Florence, we are honored to report that meaningful movement has taken place within the South Carolina Department of Corrections (SCDC) regarding the recently discussed policy implementation. This progress represents years of perseverance, patience, and principled stand by the brothers who have remained steadfast in their conscience choice to live the Culture of I-God.

Perry Correctional Institution has become the first facility to implement the policy and begin structured classes. On March 9th, the first official session was held, marking a historic step forward for those seeking knowledge, structure, and cultural expression within the institution.

As written by Understanding Self Allah: "We opened with a dedication to the God Third Eye All (Hon. James Bell, Sr.) from Orangeburg, Savior Cee, who in the early 2000s made the choice to end his own physical life while in solitary confinement because he refused to renounce Allah's Nation.

We all struggled for years, months, and days under persecution because of our conscience choice to live the Culture of I-God. Many of us made it through, but many did not. May the God Third Eye Allah Rest In Power. We Born the Civilization Class in his name. We are all moving in one accord with Allah's teachings, and we all made word is bond to not allow the sacrifices to be in vain. We will Build and Born right and exact for this entire population to see the truth of Allah World Manifest. More updates to follow. Today we Born a future. Now, we will manifest its full magnificence into existence." This moment serves as a reminder that the road to progress is often paved by the courage and sacrifice of those who stood firm before us.

As implementation begins, there are still important matters being addressed. During the review of the policy, two Honor Days that were originally listed were omitted, and this is currently being discussed with administration so that the record accurately reflects the culture and traditions of the Nation.

Additionally, discussions are underway regarding institutional volunteers, which will play a key role in ensuring the long-term stability and success of the program. The ability to bring structured classes and our study into these institutions requires coordination, responsibility, and clarity. As these developments unfold, it is critical that everyone involved remain informed and aligned.

Moving Forward Together

What will sustain this progress is unity, communication, and accountability. For this work to continue growing, it is important that we remain on the same page, communicating effectively with one another as well as with the administration at each respective institution. Clear communication ensures that misunderstandings are minimized, expectations are understood, and the work can continue to move forward in a constructive and organized way.

Every step forward represents the collective effort of many individuals working in harmony. Communication is not simply helpful, it is vital. It allows us to identify challenges early, address concerns respectfully, and maintain the integrity of what has been built.

In this role, she will assist with communication between the Nation and the Office of Cultural Management and the South Carolina Department of Corrections, helping to maintain clarity, organization, and accountability as the program develops.

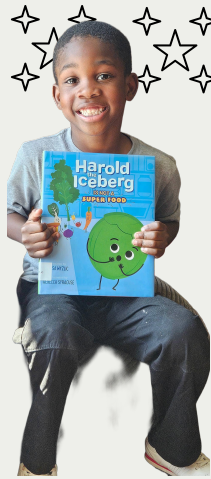

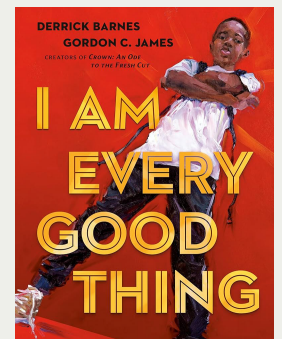
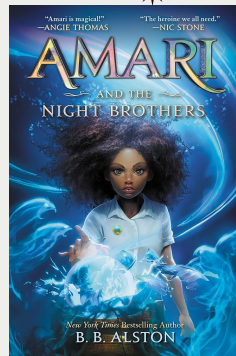

Reparations means making something right after it was wrong for a long time.

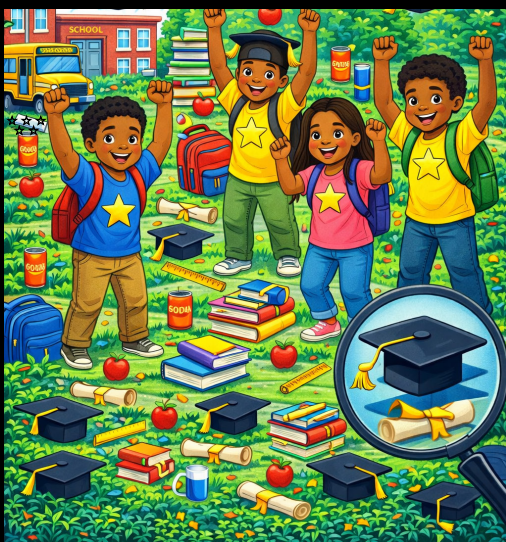

"The SAVE Act: What It Means and Why It Matters"

Staying Ready: Keep Your Documents in Order

- One of the most common issues people face is name mismatches. Check that your name is spelled the same on all documents, including:
 - First, middle, and last name
 - Hyphenations or multiple last names
 - Suffixes (Jr., Sr., III)

Even small differences can cause delays or denials when verifying identity.

Peace! In today's Legal Corner, we build on the proposed SAVE Act, a measure that centers around voting requirements and what is considered proof of citizenship when registering to vote.

At its core, the SAVE Act seeks to require individuals to provide documented proof of U.S. citizenship, such as a passport or birth certificate, when registering to vote in federal elections.

While some view this as a way to strengthen election security, others raise concern about how this may impact everyday people, especially those who may not have easy access to these documents.

Why This Matters? This is important because the right to vote is not just a legal right, it is a tool of voice, power, and participation. If additional barriers are placed in front

of that right, we must ask: • Who does this affect the most? • Who has access to the required documents? • Who may be left out unintentionally? Many people, including elders, low-income families, and those who have moved frequently, may not readily have access to original documentation. Replacing these documents can take time, money, and knowledge of the system.

Knowing Your Rights: Understanding the law allows us to move with awareness, not fear. As of now, this is proposed legislation, meaning it is still part of a larger process before becoming law. However, it reflects a broader conversation about access, identification, and participation in civic life.

This is why it is important to: • Keep personal documents in a safe and accessible place • Know what is required for voter registration in your state • Stay informed about changes to laws that affect your rights. • Keep track of expiration dates on IDs and passports. • Set reminders to renew them ahead of time so you're never caught off guard. Peace.

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that right in Charleston, South Carolina, a group of Black children from an orphanage helped shape music around the world?

The Jenkins Orphanage Band, founded in 1891 by Daniel Joseph Jenkins, became one of the most influential musical groups of its time. What began as a way to provide structure, discipline, and opportunity for young boys quickly turned into something much greater.

These children were taught music as a life skill, and before long, they were performing in parades, on city streets, and eventually on national and international stages. The band traveled across the United States and even overseas, representing Charleston and showcasing the talent, discipline, and brilliance of Black youth.

The Jenkins Orphanage Band is credited with helping to spread the early sounds of what would become jazz and ragtime. Their performances introduced audiences around the world to a new style of music rooted in rhythm, creativity, and cultural expression.

At a time when opportunities for Black children were extremely limited, these young musicians were:

- Touring internationally
- Performing for large audiences
- Breaking barriers through excellence
- Representing Black culture with pride

Their sound and style influenced the development of American music and helped lay the foundation for future generations of musicians. The legacy of the Jenkins Orphanage Band reminds us that our youth, when given guidance and opportunity, can impact the world.
