KWANZAA: A CELEBRATION OF THE HARVEST

Kwanzaa Is Not Seasonal

Kwanzaa is often seen as a seven-day holiday observed from December 26th to January 1st. The candles are lit, the principles are read, the family gathers, and then once the new year arrives, it is quietly packed away until the next December. But for our people, Kwanzaa was never meant to live only on the calendar. It was meant to live in our character.

Just like the 12 Jewels guide our way of thinking, refining, and moving with purpose every day, the Seven Principles of Kwanzaa serve as a daily blueprint for how Black people build, protect, and elevate our families and our Nation.

It is important to clarify that Kwanzaa is not a part of the formal teachings of the Nation of Gods and Earths. However, what is essential is how we live as Black people, with structure, responsibility, creativity, unity, economics, purpose, and commitment. These principles do not replace Supreme Wisdom; they complement the work we already know must be done.

Peace! The word Kwanzaa is a Swahili word which means "first fruits." This is a celebration whose origins derive from the ancient tradition of the community coming together to celebrate the season's end harvest, the food and grain from the field which would sustain their existence for another seasonal cycle.

Our harvest is the Nguzo Saba: The Seven Principles, which we come together and recommit (harvest) ourselves to for another year. As the ancients did with their harvest to sustain them for another seasonal cycle, we too go into the new year with a renewed commitment to the Nguzo Saba:

- Unity over differences,
- Self-Determination despite circumstances,
- Collective Work and Responsibility despite diversities,
- Cooperative Economics for the betterment of all,
- Purpose which gives our life a daily drive of Good Orderly Direction,
- Creativity which gives us a vision of that which is achievable if we work for it, and
- Faith that the power of the Supreme Creator will continue to flow within our hearts and mind as us, letting us know that we have the free will and power to recommit ourselves to the harvest of the Nguzo Saba and uphold its principles for another year.

Kwanzaa, as a celebration which moves in accord with the Culture of I-God, shows us that:

- Unity (Umoja) is Knowledge,
- Self-Determination (Kujichagulia) is Wisdom,
- Collective Work and Responsibility (Ujima) is Understanding,
- Cooperative Economics (Ujamaa) is Culture Freedom,
- Purpose (Nia) is Power Refinement,
- Creativity (Kuumba) is Equality, and
- Faith (Imani) is God.

Can you Cee the science? OK. Let's Build.

Knowledge is the foundation of our origin in this world. When we awaken to this foundation, we come to know each other as one people. The Original. Allah. This is our Unity.

Wisdom is our drive to choose, to choose if we will accept or reject the Knowledge of Self, and to make a determination as to who we will and will not be.

Understanding is when we put knowledge and wisdom together and create a collective comprehension to be utilized to take responsibility for our own self, family, and Nation. It is a response based on our ability.

Culture Freedom is the unhindered expression of our divine innate nature, thought out and lived out as I Self Lord And Master, a cooperative Nation living in one accord for the economic success (What We Will Achieve) on earth.

Power Refinement is Purpose that which drives and gives our life reason and direction. A constant renewal of our mind, ensuring the continuous growth and elevation of our life.

Equality is Creativity to develop and maintain a balance of ideas and thoughts within the mind, which are utilized to create a tangible existence in the physical.

God is Faith, our commitment to living out the Good Orderly Direction of our divine nature as a daily existence of I Self Lord And Master. The supreme force of life self-created into physical flesh as the Arm, Leg, Leg, Arm, Head of the Original People.

Kwanzaa is a celebration of our heritage as the Original People on the planet Earth, and the Nguzo Saba instills within us righteous principles to live by and teach, just as the SM and SA does. To fail to Cee this truth is to limit your vision. Just know that the only limitations we have are the ones which we make. Peace!

Understanding Self Allah

Illuminating the Path: How Supreme Principles Intersect with the Nguzo Saba

Peace, Gods and Earths! As we continue to build and manifest our divine selves, it's vital to understand the intricate threads connecting our foundational Supreme Mathematics and Supreme Alphabet to other profound expressions of Black liberation and identity. Today, let's shine a light on how our core principles—Knowledge, Wisdom, Understanding, and beyond—find direct, powerful resonance within the Nguzo Saba, the Seven Principles of Kwanzaa. This mapping is not merely an intellectual exercise; it's a living blueprint for manifesting our highest selves both individually and collectively.

Consider 1 – Knowledge. This isn't just knowing facts; it's Knowing Self, the cornerstone of our existence. This directly aligns with Kujichagulia (Self-Determination). To truly know who you are as Allah (A), as God (G), as I (I), is to determine your own destiny, free from the shackles of ignorance.

Our 2 – Wisdom provides the clarity for Nia (Purpose). Wisdom discerns our collective mission, steering us towards constructive action, ensuring our birth (B) and present (N) serve a divine aim. 3 – Understanding fosters Umoja (Unity), teaching us to see and accept our brothers and sisters, creating a collective strength that is truly unbreakable.

4 – Culture/Freedom ignites Kuumba (Creativity). Our culture is not static; it's a living testament to our generative power, a continuous act of creative renewal (O – Cipher, W – Wisdom/Woman). This is our inherent freedom to shape and build.

When we speak of 5 – Power/Refinement, we are talking about channeling our energy into Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics). True power (P) is refined (M – Master) and used to establish shared wealth and Equality (E) for all, not for individual gain.

6 – Equality finds its spiritual twin in Imani (Faith). Our faith (L – Love/Right, T – Truth) is not blind; it is a moral conviction in our people, our principles, and the divine order. It is the unwavering belief that equality is not just possible, but right.

Finally, 8 – Build/Destroy is the very essence of Ujima (Collective Work & Responsibility). This is our duty to engage in collective labor—to construct what uplifts and remove what oppresses. It is how justice (J) is manifested through shared effort, led by Kings (K) and Queens (Q) who serve the community. Even God (7), as the Universal Cipher, undergirds Umoja—the ultimate unity of all creation.

This mapping reveals that the path of the God and Earth is intrinsically linked to the ethical and cultural resurgence articulated in the Nguzo Saba. Let us embrace these connections, using them as tools to build, teach, and liberate, manifesting Heaven on Earth. Peace!



WORD OF THE MONTH: SUSU

Susu (say it slowly: soo-soo) is a community savings system that has helped Black families build wealth, start businesses, and support one another for generations. It is built on trust, responsibility, and unity, the same values we teach in Star's Corner. Why SUSU Matters Today:

- It teaches financial discipline
- It strengthens family and community bonds
- It reminds us that our ancestors built wealth by working together
- It prepares our babies to understand economics in a cultural way
- It reflects principles like Ujima (Collective Work) and Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics)

SUPREME MATHEMATICS: What principle teaches about collective growth?

Note: you may see more than one.

Queen I-Wisdom Understanding Earth:

Susu is when a group works together to save money and help each other. Everyone puts in a little, and when it's your turn, you get help too. That's called collective work and responsibility.

Susu shows the Kwanzaa principles of Ujima (working together) and Ujamaa (helping our community grow). When we share, plan, and trust each other, everyone wins.

Through Susu, we see that economics, unity, and responsibility are not just ideas we talk about during Kwanzaa, they are daily actions we live out.

When we practice Susu, we practice Kwanzaa year-round..


"When we put our gifts together, we grow together. SUSU teaches us that one hand alone can't build a nation, but many hands can."

Peace, Stars! We learn that a Susu is when everyone puts a little together to make something big. It teaches us that we don't have to do everything alone. When each of us shares what we can like our coins, our time, or our help, we are practicing collective work and responsibility. That means we care about the whole group, not just ourselves. A Susu shows us that when we take turns, stay honest, and look out for one another, everyone gets a chance to grow. Just like planting seeds in a garden, each small contribution matters, and when we work together, the harvest is greater for all of us. Peace.

Queen I-Wisdom Understanding Earth

**Star's Corner Activity:
"Watch It Grow!"**

This activity can be done at home, class, or Parliament.

**Materials Needed**

- A jar, cup, or container
- Paper stars (or circles), crayons, markers
- Optional: stickers with the children's names

Instructions

1. Each child colors or decorates a star with their name on it.
2. Every meeting, when a child:
 - Helps someone
 - Shares
 - Shows responsibility
 - Demonstrates teamwork
 - Completes a task or reads a book
 ...they add one star into the Unity Jar.
3. When the jar is full, the whole group receives a collective reward such as:
 - Stickers
 - Extra playing time
 - A small treat
 - Certificates

**Purpose of the Activity**

- Reinforces teamwork and community care
- Helps children visually understand how SUSU works
- Encourages them to look for ways to help one another

Expected Lesson: "Shows how small contributions make a big result"

**"NGE Recognition Within SCDC: Registry, Process, and Protection"****ATTENTION!****Savior Cee's Registry Explanation (Why It's Important)**

- The registry confirms recognized status
- It helps identify the "best knower" at each institution
- It supports authorization for classes and Parliaments
- It protects participants from unnecessary obstruction
- It assists with communication from interior to exterior
- It helps those transitioning into an institution
- It supports safety and accountability

Peace! If anyone coming in the name of the Nation of Gods and Earths is experiencing issues obtaining literature or lessons that do comply with SCDC policies, it is important that these matters are formally brought to the attention of The Fruits of Eden. We are in the final stages of a policy revision based on the ruling from 9:17-cv-01608-DCN, and accuracy matters. All incidents must be documented and recorded so they can be addressed properly. As always, we move in a wise and civilized way, ensuring our actions reflect knowledge, discipline, and responsibility.

We must also identify the best knower from each institution in order to move forward correctly with holding classes and Parliaments in an organized and effective manner. **Once the updated policy is fully implemented**, anyone seeking formal recognition as Nation of Gods and Earths within SCDC, including participation in classes and NGE activities must be officially recognized in the system by the Chaplain. This requires submitting a request through the proper channel. Contact your Chaplain to obtain and complete the necessary form. While their terminology may differ from ours, we know who we are and what we are dealing with, and we will continue to move with patience, precision, and purpose. In the meantime, work directly with your Chaplain (some are waiting for the policy to be completed) and make sure you are listed on our registry that's being managed by the Fruits of Eden and/or a Captain (see page 6). This is essential.

**"Roots & Remedies"**

Mucus is the body's natural protector, it traps dust, germs, and irritants to keep us safe. However, when mucus builds up too much, it can cause congestion, coughing, sluggish breathing, and discomfort. This often happens during cold weather, seasonal changes, or when the body is overloaded with stress, processed foods, or dairy-heavy diets.

Our ancestors understood the importance of keeping the body flowing and balanced. In many African and traditional healing systems, warmth, hydration, and herbs were key to clearing congestion and restoring harmony in the body. Supporting the lungs and sinuses isn't about forcing the body, it's about assisting it in doing what it already knows how to do. Ginger helps:

- Break down excess mucus
- Warm the body and stimulate circulation
- Support digestion and immune balance


**How to use:**

Slice fresh ginger and steep it in hot water for 10-15 minutes. Sip slowly once daily, especially in the morning or evening.

DID YOU KNOW?



Did you know that Atlantic Beach in South Carolina is owned by blacks? Atlantic Beach, the "Black Pearl" was founded by four Black families who created a beachfront spot where Black people could own businesses, relax, and thrive during segregation. It was built entirely through Ujamaa with shared resources and economic cooperation. Atlantic Beach is one of the few remaining Black-owned and Black-governed beach communities in the United States. What began in the 1930s as a refuge from segregation, by and for Black people, has endured generations of hardship, change, and pressure. That endurance makes Atlantic Beach not just a place on the map, but a standing monument to Black self-determination, culture, and economic cooperation.

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Atlantic Beach has faced a lot of change, each threatening its identity and ownership. Over decades, disinvestment, population decline, and rising development pressures threatened to overwrite Atlantic Beach's culture, history, and ownership...common issues faced by many historically Black coastal and Gullah-Geechee communities.

Let Atlantic Beach be more than nostalgia: let it be a living example of how we build, protect, and sustain our people through remembrance, intention, collective responsibility, and action.

In conjunction with the National Office of Cultural Management at Allah School in Mecca, Understanding Self Allah and the Gods and Earths in Savior Cee are advising SCDC officials with the drafting of a policy for recognizing and accommodating NGE cultural practices. Officials report that the process is underway. Once completed, the policy will be shared with institutions, allowing us to hold classes, parliaments, and honor days. We're making progress with support from the best knowers who have successfully completed this process in other states. We will keep you updated. Peace!
